Mediation is a confidential process for resolving conflict in which an impartial third party – a mediator – helps people in conflict find a solution that is acceptable to everyone involved. Mediation may be used to address areas such as: divorce, parenting plans, elder issues, landlord/tenant issues, legal matters, health and medical issues, or real estate disputes. Mediation services may be provided on a sliding fee scale for those with qualifying income.

In 2014, Congress passed the Achieving a Better Life Experience Act (ABLE) as a financial tool for people with disabilities. In Nebraska, this is known as the Enable Savings Plan. Enable allows Nebraskans with certain disabilities to create tax-advantaged ABLE savings accounts to pay for qualified disability-related expenses.

Nebraska Family Helpline

The Nebraska Family Helpline makes it easier for families to obtain assistance by providing a single contact point 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Trained Helpline operators screen calls to assess immediate safety needs, identify the potential level of a behavioral health crisis, make recommendations or referrals to appropriate resources, and help callers connect to emergency resources or providers. The Helpline is supervised by licensed mental health professionals.

Family Helpline operators also can connect eligible families to the Family Navigator Service. This service helps families move through Nebraska's child- and family-care system more efficiently to get the assistance they need. Available within 24 to 72 hours after a Helpline referral, Family Navigator helps families identify existing community-based services and provides support from people who have had personal experience in the system.
